<h3>Tax</h3> <p>Tax is the money people have to pay to the government to help them provide services and things that everyone needs.</p>	<h3>Band Council</h3> <p>Band councils are a local government in Indigenous communities.</p>	<h3>Public Services</h3> <p>The municipal government employs public servants to fulfill their responsibilities such as managing libraries, waste management, and snow removal.</p>	<h3>Municipal Council</h3> <p>A municipal council works for the local government, elected by the community, to make decisions and help run the city.</p>	<h3>Head of Council</h3> <p>The head of council is the person who leads the municipal council and makes those decisions and leads the council.</p>	<h3>Bylaw</h3> <p>Bylaws are local rules that apply to people in a town or city.</p>

<h3>Budget</h3> <p>A budget is the amount of money they have available for government spending.</p>	<h3>Premier</h3> <p>In Canada, a premier is the leader of a province or territory. Each province or territory has its own premier who is elected by the people of that region.</p>	<h3>Opposition</h3> <p>The parties that are not in power are called opposition parties. They provide advice to the government and offer a different perspective.</p>	<h3>Bill</h3> <p>A bill is an idea for a new law suggested by an MPP. Bills get reviewed and debated.</p>	<h3>Charter and Freedoms</h3> <p>The Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms guarantees rights and freedoms in Canadian society.</p>	<h3>Act</h3> <p>Acts are binding rules that have the force of law and govern various aspects of society.</p>

<h3>Constitution</h3> <p>The Constitution describes the main laws of the country, the structure of the government, and the powers of provinces and the powers of the federal government.</p>	<h3>Boycott</h3> <p>A boycott is when people decide not to buy products or services because they think something is wrong.</p>	<h3>Legislative Branch</h3> <p>The legislative branch of government is responsible for making laws.</p>	<h3>Executive Branch</h3> <p>The executive branch of government implements and enforces laws.</p>	<h3>Judicial Branch</h3> <p>The judicial branch interprets government laws and applies them in court.</p>	<h3>Prime Minister</h3> <p>The Canadian Prime Minister is the leader of the government in Canada. They are in charge of making important decisions for the country.</p>
